Recurrent neural networks. Foundations of Deep Learning. Importance of Deep learning for representation. Current models for image and speech recognition. Adversarial Networks. Challenges of Deep Learning.

Focus on tools for multivariate data analysis and how to handle uncertain data with probability models. Both static and time varying data fitting and classification problems will be covered.
